WARRIOR FOOTBALL

The Warriors finished their month of September by hosting the Biggar Blazers under the lights on September 27. The boys wore their pink uniforms in support of Breast Cancer Awareness month. The Warriors scored two early touchdowns from Ethan Bertoia and Dawson Grant but Biggar held their ground and mounted a comeback in the second half. In the end the Warriors escaped with a narrow 14-13 victory. On October 3 the Warriors hosted Eatonville. The boys scored early and often, routing the Spartans and rolling to an easy 77-28 victory. The last game of the regular season was played on October 11 in Rosetown. The Warriors were looking for some revenge for their early season defeat to the Royals and a chance to finish as the Conference Champion. Unfortunately, the Warriors fell behind early, and despite battling hard, were unable to keep pace with the high octane Rosetown offense. The 70-22 defeat put the Warriors firmly in second place in the league and allowed them to host Biggar for the League Playoff and the chance to head to Wakarusa for the Provincial Quarterfinals. The Warriors fell behind early to Biggar and battled back and forth throughout the first half. The second half, however, was all Warriors. Noah Gumpinger threw 6 touchdown passes and kicked a field goal to help lead the Warriors to a 60-37 victory over Biggar. With a 5-2 season record, the Warriors were set to travel to Wakarusa on October 28 to take on the Conference 4 champs in a rematch of the 2023 provincial quarterfinals. The Warriors opened the game strong. After recovering a Wakarusa fumble on the game's opening kickoff, Noah Gumpinger connected on a deep pass to Dawson Grant to put the Warriors ahead early. The game was back and forth throughout the first half, but an unfortunate series of events had the Warriors down 51-23 heading into the half. The Warriors showed perseverance in the face of adversity. They had a strong drive to open the 3rd quarter, resulting in a touchdown. From there they battled back and forth with Wakarusa in the second half, outscoring Wakarusa, but unfortunately coming up a bit too short, falling 66-53. The Warriors would like to thank their graduating players Dawson Rusk, Zen Halter, Rhett Berki, Kieran Wildeman, Mateo Rutley, Ethan Bertoia, Brandt Gilbert, Noah Gumpinger and Jager Lewin. KidSport helps children of families facing financial obstacles to participate in sport, so that no kid is left on the sidelines.

Who is eligible to receive a KidSport grant?

- Families that are low-income and facing financial barriers.
- Grants are for children and youth 5 to 18 years of age.
- Amateur sport programs.

What does KidSport cover?

- Sport registration fee
- Children could be eligible for up to, but not guaranteed financial support of \$750.00 per child per calendar year (Jan-Dec).

KidSport Guidelines

- Applications must be filled out completely and appropriate documentation submitted.
- Applications must be submitted before the start date of the sport activity.
- KidSport does not fund team fees, camps, travel, tournaments, championships, high performance, sports field trips, specialized training, fitness memberships, swim passes, dance, etc.
- For a list of eligible sports, please visit: www.kidsportcanada.ca/saskatchewan
- Generally accepted sport activities are those recognized and/or sanctioned by the member organizations of Sask Sport.

How to apply to KidSport:

1. Register your child into a sport program.
2. Apply for KidSport well in advance of the sport program.
3. Visit website to apply www.kidsportcanada.ca/saskatchewan and choose the chapter in your community. If your community does not have a chapter - choose the Provincial Fund for your application.
4. Complete the KidSport application form online or with a paper application.
5. Double check that ALL information has been filled out and that all appropriate documentation has been submitted. Do not submit until application is complete.
6. Submit completed application to your Local KidSport Chapter either online, via email to kidsport@sasksport.ca or through mail.
7. Please allow up to six weeks for notification of application status.
8. Applicant will be emailed of application status.
9. **If the application has been approved, KidSport will issue funds directly to the sport organization on behalf of the child.**
